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How to change the world: Speakers and topics from the 21st IAVE World Volunteer Conference

The entire world of volunteerism is on display at the World Volunteer Conference, but what exactly does that mean? In its simplest form, the conference is structured around five main topic areas, or tracks:

- The Power of One;
- Many Helping Hands;
- From Good to Great;
- Mega Volunteering Trends;
- And Strategic Issues in Volunteer Management.

Each track contains workshops that cover a whole range of subject matter but centre around a certain key idea: for the Power of One this might be how to maximise individual potential, while for Mega Volunteering Trends it might be large-scale mobilisation of concerned citizens. By picking out a variety of workshops and forums across the tracks, you'd be sure to cover a wide variety of trends and ideas related to volunteerism, although you can also focus on a single track if it particularly suits your interests.

Here are a few examples of the people and ideas you can expect to encounter at the conference:

Flavia Pansieri

As one fluent in six languages (including Chinese, Spanish and German) and well-versed in everything from fighting drugs to championing women's rights, Flavia Pansieri is an undeniably global citizen, one who's dedicated her life to bettering those of others in less fortunate circumstances. The eloquent Italian national – who also holds degrees in Philosophy, Literature and Chinese – has served with the



United Nations in numerous capacities since 1983, with her many talents now being put to use as Executive Co-ordinator of the UN Volunteer Programme. While proud of the milestones which the UN has reached so far in areas like human rights and sustainability, Pansieri isn't one to sit on her laurels, working to address pressing issues of climate change and human development through volunteer initiatives both existing and new. With her sharp intellect, quiet confidence and determination at the helm of the UN's volunteer work, Pansieri's formidable track record at helping others looks set to grow even more in the future.

Flavia Pansieri will be speaking at the Opening Ceremony on Day 1 of the World Volunteer Conference.

Tadateru Konoe

You wouldn't pick it from his humble demeanour, but Tadateru Konoe actually hails from one of Japan's leading aristocratic families. The President of the International Federation of the Red Cross/Red Crescent has devoted his life to the service of others, starting off as a volunteer in his local Japanese Red Cross chapter and progressing through the ranks to lead some of the most important aid and development missions



in the Red Cross/Red Crescent's history. As someone who's experienced virtually every facet of volunteer work – from leading tsunami aid teams to co-ordinating national plans for disaster response – Konoe is respected throughout the Red Cross/Red Crescent for his continual desire to learn from and empathise with all people, no matter where they're from. Perhap's it's no coincidence that Konoe shares his birthday with Jean Henri Dunant, the founder of the Red Cross/Red Crescent – nor that the aristocratic family to which he belongs has a longstanding tradition of devoted service to others.

Tadateru Konoe will be presenting the Keynote Address on Day 2 of the World Volunteer Conference.

Dr Surin Pitsuwan

He's been an academic, a writer, and a politician, but now Dr Surin Pitsuwan is the Secretary-General of ASEAN, a role he's held since 2008. The illustrious career of this activist and scholar, which has spanned the globe and numerous organisations from the UN Human Security Trust Fund to the United States Congress, very much befits Pitsuwan's passionate yet good-natured approach to his work and the world,



something which has brought him more than a little acclaim in his active approach to leading ASEAN. Pitsuwan is no stranger to engaging big groups of people both in politics and non-profit affairs, and he'll be doing so in the forum "Engaging Volunteers, Raising Communities" when he talks about how to inspire and bring people together for the long haul.

The forum featuring Dr Surin Pitsuwan, "Engaging Volunteers, Raising Communities" (Forum 520), will be held on Day 3 of the World Volunteer Conference.

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More than a Tropical Paradise: Singapore's Role as Volunteer Hub
